- Analysis and Comparison of the Nudging Strategies adopted in the fight against Obesity;
- Analysis and Comparison of the Integration Process of these Strategies in EU Member States Legal Systems;
- Analysis of the Legal Problems that could emerge from this Integration;
- Analysis of the Consequences in Liberal Democracies of Behavioral Devices that mark a Transition from Legislative to Regulatory Instruments.

Main Results

The main result of my Project will be a critical analysis of the factors that have prevented the EU countries from achieving a reduction in eating disorders, especially obesity.

Research Contribution

Why should you care?

Within the European Union, no country, until now, has achieved satisfactory results in policies to fight against obesity.

A study, carried out by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) showed that, since 1990, obesity has experienced a worrying increase in most European countries, and overweight is recorded in more than 50% of the population in 18 EU Member States. Even more alarming is the dramatic increase of overweight and obesity among children and teenagers.
